## A Whale of a Time

During a recent trip to Sydney I visited the Australian National Maritime Museum and was transfixed by an exhibition of life-size photography entitled "Beautiful Whale".

The photographer, Bryant Austin, waits for weeks, sometimes months, snorkelling or remaining motionless in the water so that the whales become used to him as a familiar being in their environment. Eventually, the whales approach, coming as close as two metres to him. Austin, using a 50-megapixel Hasselblad camera, then takes up to 300 images of the whale in five-foot, vertical sections. From these images, he selects 15-20 to create composite, life-size portraits. The results are compelling.

## Bird Man

In our club we have a few very capable bird photographers. One of them, David Woolcock, captured the following image, *Mein Nein*, in the Green Hill Road Dam area about ten minutes away from the Honeyeater Picnic Area in Chiltern-Mt Pilot National Park. Many readers will remember this area from a wildflower shoot in October last year.

David explains "When I arrived I observed that there were many Fuscous and Yellow-tufted Honeyeaters having a territorial dispute, chasing each other through the low shrubs. I had restricted views of the action so opted to walk to the other side of the dam and settled-in to wait.

Details Camera: Canon 1D Mark IV Lens: Canon 400mm f2.8 IS USM II + Canon 1.4x III Extender @ 560mm, 1/200sec @ f9. Monopod with a Wimberley WH200 Gibal Tripod Head. Subject distance: approx. 40 metres

It took about 15 minutes for the arguments and chases to restart. Suddenly two birds tumbled out of the top part of a shrub, landed on a branch in the open below and began their argument. I quickly focussed on the larger of the two birds and started firing. This camera body is capable of burts of up to 40 shots at 10 frames per second. Luckily, I was using a monopd as there was low light from an overcast sky and handheld at 1/200 sec would not have allowed such a sharp shot. It was comical as the birds began to voice their objections to each other – this image shows both birds beak-to-beak, the human equivalent of yelling at each other.

### **Club Competitions**

Additionally, any manipulation or modification to the original image is limited to only minor retouching of blemishes and must not alter the content of the original scene.
