Turning Diesel into Memories

Club member David Woolcock has recently returned home from his travels. Here David shares a brief summary of his journey and images of one of the many bird species he captured. For more stories and wonderful images I encourage you to visit his blog.

'For many of you the title will be familiar, as this was the name of the blog series that chronicled my 7-month trip through Central Australia and the NW of WA. During that time, I drove over 22,000 km and was away from home for 208 days. I also took in excess of 26,000 images during that time. This is not as hard as you might expect when doing bird photography shooting at very high frame rates. As you can imagine not all these images are of a high quality, so it is a task to weed out what I would regard as a usable shot for either publishing or competitions.'

'These shots are of Australasian Fig birds feeding in the trees surrounding the military museum at Lee Point in Darwin. I had parked in the shade to enjoy a late lunch after driving around sightseeing. When I parked there, I was not aware of the vast variety of birds feeding in the tree above me. One particular bird was very colourful as he (most bright birds in the avian world are males) flitted through the branches picking the fruit. He was very noisy as he moved from one berry pod to the next calling to his mate.'



SIMPLICITY



When all those elements that a photographer uses [frame, perspective, focus, time] come together and the viewer feels the connection immediately with the image because they understand the meaning. The vocabulary of the photograph is unambiguous and clear.



Several methods can achieve simplicity in a photograph. The most obvious is to place the subject against a neutral background such as a backdrop or the sky. Backgrounds can be entirely neutral, like a solid backdrop or a cloudless sky; or they can complement the image, like a starfish on the sand.









Bokeh



Over recent months some judges have been making reference to either good or bad "bokeh". [correctly pronounced as bo-ke].



In photography bokeh is the aesthetic quality of the blur produced in out-of-focus parts of an image. Bokeh has also been defined as "the way the lens renders out-of-focus points of light. Differences in lens aberrations and aperture shape cause very different bokeh effects. Some lens designs blur the image in a way that is pleasing to the eye while others produce distracting or unpleasant blurring ["good" and "bad" bokeh respectively]. Photographers may deliberately use a shallow focus technique to create images with prominent out-of-focus regions accentuating their len's bokeh.



Bokeh is often most visible around small background highlights such as specular reflections and light sources which is why it is often associated with such areas. However, bokeh is not limited to highlights; blur occurs in all regions of an image which are outside the depth of field.



"Good" bokeh is especially important for macro lenses and long telephoto lenses because they are typically used in situations that produce shallow depth of field. Good bokeh is also important for medium telephoto lenses [typically 85-150 mm on 35 mm format]. When used in portrait photography [for their "natural" perspective] the photographer usually wants a shallow depth of field so that the subject stands out sharply against a blurred background.

WHAT RUBBISH.... you may well think!

But beware, mobile photography is advancing at quite a fast pace.

Following last week's VAPS AGM [via Zoom] a presentation by Lyn Hayward from the Frankston Club was given on mobile photography. What an eye opener as to what is already available and being achieved in this format.

Whilst I am aware that our club has a few members who are currently using their mobiles to photograph, I think the majority of us have given it little, or no attention other than a few selfies.

When 2022 arrives and club meetings/outings can return, some presentations/workshops will no doubt cover this mode of photography. I note all current members have a mobile of some sort. So rather than being left at the starting post, why not get some basics under way over the next few months.

Now, let's start at the very beginning

Be aware your phone is a germ carrier, simply due to where it is constantly used and left. Cleaning with 70% isopropyl alcohol cleaning wipes is the best way to clean the screen, back and sides. Common household cleaners such as bleach, glass cleaner and antibacterial spray can permanently damage the screen.

Now, to learn what your camera can do

This is best achieved by getting out and taking images on your various phone settings, noting what works best and what does not. Few phones have manuals that cover the camera functions in detail. Experimentation is the best educator.

Eventually you may find your phone does not have some functions built in. There are a number of apps available that will cover these missing fields.

Following the preliminaries a good web recourse is https://iphonephotographyschool.com/. Whilst this site does promote a tutorial course, there are a number of free videos that can be viewed which provide very good education material.
